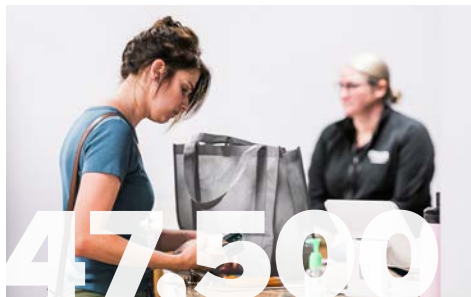

Great Idea & Big Idea Grants

Buddi Dean, the assistant principal at Oakland Elementary, received a Big Idea Grant to purchase Math Bridges Curriculum. The Math Bridges Curriculum helps to close the math gap for students receiving special services and one-on-one intervention. After seeing the success of the program at another school, the team at Oakland Elementary knew that this program would help their students grasp and retain mathematical lessons. The curriculum includes drilled-down assessments, hands-on manipulatives, and systematic lessons. It helps to build the fundamental and concrete knowledge needed to work more complex math problems. Each 30-minute, focused lesson address gaps that are indicated by the Universal Screener data, as well as weekly monitoring.



Kendra Poszywak, a math teacher at West Creek High School, received a Great Idea Grant to design original escape rooms for her students. Although digital escape rooms are great, she wanted to allow for hands-on components so that the project reaches more students in their learning styles. Through a Great Idea Grant, she created a math based “Where in the World is Carmen San Diego” themed escape room. Students solve complex problems to find locations on the map and finally discover where the treasure is hidden. Initiatives like this encourage students to persevere through a problem instead of just guessing or quitting. The escape room allows students to apply their understanding of a variety of math topics, to include polar math, vector math, and trigonometry. The more students are engaged in the learning, the more the students will retain and be able to apply concepts to a variety of applications.



Becky Padgett, assistant principal at Rossview High School, received a Big Idea Grant to engage and encourage her students with simple rewards. As students succeed in accomplishing assignments and completing lessons, they have the chance to win gift cards and other small tokens. Through a grant from the CMC Education Foundation, the school was able to purchase a variety of reward items for students. These incentives are to support seniors, both virtual and traditional, as they prepare for graduation. Goal setting and celebrating achievements help prepare our future generations for a successful place in the community.

Amanda Wilson, school librarian at St. Bethlehem Elementary, received a Big Idea Grant to purchase books for "Books for Behavior" as an incentive that combines a love for literacy and encouragement to make positive choices. Through a grant from the CMC Education Foundation, Amanda Wilson and Megan Cunningham, academic coach, purchased over 900 books to go towards the program. Students are rewarded with tokens when they display exemplary behavior and support St. B's STRONG focus (Service, Tenacity, Responsibility, Organization, Notice, Growth).

On average, 80 books are distributed each month. Studies have shown that increasing literacy rates also improve grades, attendance, and behavior.



Michelle Winters, a kindergarten teacher at Carmel Elementary, received a Great Idea Grant to purchase Wonder Workshop Dash Coding Robots. "Coding is the future for today's students," she said. "Lighting that coding spark for some of our youngest learners can now open countless doors of opportunity for new hobbies, interests, and even potential careers." In kindergarten, students learn how to collaborate and work together to accomplish a goal. Ms. Winters knows these robots will encourage students to work as a team to solve a problem, build determination, and enhance creativity.



Welcome Back Breakfast

Because of the generous donation by our presenting sponsor, Cornerstone Financial Credit Union, the Foundation delivered over 4,000 breakfasts to our Clarksville-Montgomery County School System teachers and staff during the week before school kicked off.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual employee Convocation was canceled. This served as an opportunity in the past for employees to come together and re-energize for the upcoming school year. The Foundation felt it was important to offer a token of appreciation to our employees to let them know how grateful we are for their commitment to our students.

A total of 656 students, who passed 1,046 exams, participated in the 12th Annual Pass and Go event. For each AP exam students pass with a score of 3, 4 or 5, their chances of winning increase.

In 2020, the event was held virtually and was a great success! **Payton Clapsaddle from Rossvie High School** walked away with a new car and several of our students were able to win gift cards, laptops, and iPads.

The initiative began in 2009 with slightly more than 200 students who successfully passed the AP exam. It was created as an incentive for students to take more rigorous courses in high school and to improve the exam passing rate.

Academic Awards

For the 31st year, the Clarksville-Montgomery County School System and Education Foundation continued a tradition of recognizing the academic excellence of CMCSS high school students. While we could not join with our award winners in person, the Foundation held a virtual event to recognize all third-year recipients. They each received a certificate, lapel pin, and silver honor cord. Each student receiving the honor cord had the opportunity to wear it at graduation.

To receive the academic achievement award, a student must maintain a 93% grade average with no grade lower than 85 in any one subject. This academic criteria has remained the same since the inception of the program. During typical years, students who are first or second-year recipients are honored at school assemblies in the spring, and third-year recipients are invited to be recognized at a Foundation and community-sponsored banquet with their families.



Red Carpet Awards

The Education Foundation, in partnership with the Director of Schools, and James Corlew Chevrolet, honors teachers selected by their schools to represent CMCSS as the building-level "Teachers of the Year." The educators are recognized for their hard work and dedication. This program is one way the Foundation can say thank you to teachers and encourage them to keep doing great things for our students.

This year's Virtual Red Carpet Awards recognized 63 teachers and was live-streamed across several digital channels. Of those 63 teachers, three finalists were chosen as district-level "Teachers of the Year." At random, two of these finalists received a \$500 Visa gift card, courtesy of the Foundation and its sponsors. The remaining finalist received a Chevrolet Spark from event sponsor James Corlew Chevrolet.

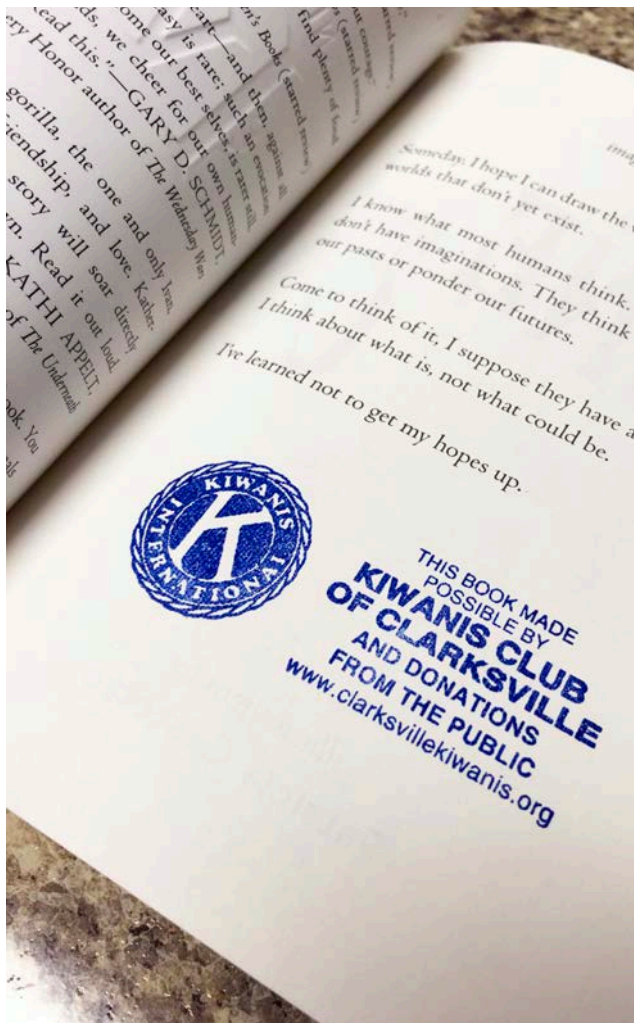
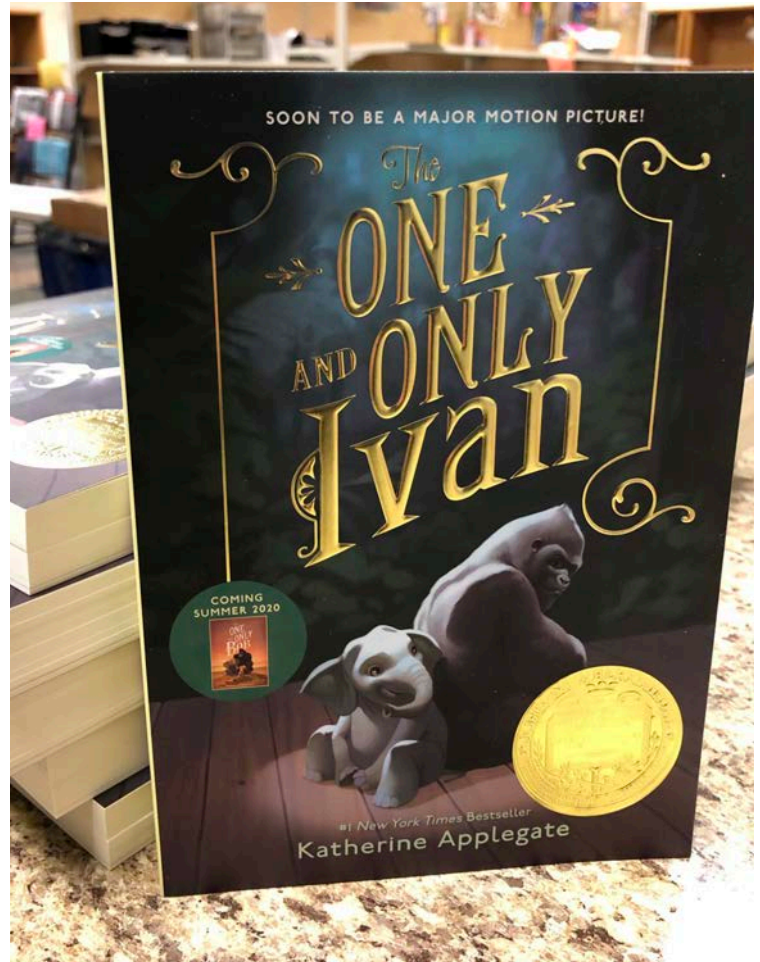

As we continued to navigate the pandemic and how that would affect learning, the CMCSS Technology Department worked tirelessly to ensure each student received a laptop and, for those who needed it, a mobile hotspot. **Google provided a \$22,000 technology grant** to help purchase around 70 mobile hotspots. These were added to the inventory of all materials being provided to several thousand students.



When learning and play combine, the results are tremendous. **After receiving a \$5,200 grant from the Clarksville Google Data Center**, the CMC Education Foundation purchased 22 Lego WeDo robotics kits for the STEM-designated elementary schools. Carmel and Moore Magnet students are now exploring science and innovation through hands-on activities.

We are excited to see what these young engineers create!


